Public parking is available near the station.

1983 Program of Field Trips

Field trips are conducted on both Tuesday and Wednesday of the week following each lecture. The colorcoded tour tickets are valid only on the dates for which they are issued and must be presented for admission. There are no refunds on field trip tickets, and no replacement of lost tickets can be made. The price of each tour is \$25.00. Luncheon (gratuity included) is provided on all tours. Tours depart from and return to the Chicago and North Western Station, boarding at the corner of Clinton and Madison streets, unless otherwise noted. Tours operate on closely coordinated schedules, and the departure of buses cannot be delayed for latecomers. Comfortable shoes are recommended on all tours. Since program arrangements must be made many months in advance, scheduled events may sometimes be subject to change. Smoking is not permitted on the buses. Please read carefully the instructions on how to order tickets.

Tour One Tuesday, Sept. 13 ● Wednesday, Sept. 14
Depart from the North Western Station at 9:00 A.M. for
the Widow Clarke House, the city's oldest residence.

Travel to Pilsen to learn about the 18th Street Corporation's restoration and neighborhood employment program. After viewing Pilsen's dramatic street murals we will proceed to the Board of Trade. The rest of the tour is on foot and includes a walk through the Annex to the Board of Trade Building, designed by Helmut Jahn, and a tour of the striking new offices of the law firm of Reuben and Proctor in a rehabilitated building. A box lunch in the Bismarck Theatre (the old Palace Theatre) will be followed by a special tour of the soon-to-be completed State of Illinois Building, which was also designed by Helmut Jahn.

Tour Two Tuesday, Sept. 27 ● Wednesday, Sept. 28 For the past 15 years the Jeff Awards have focused national attention on the work of Chicago's Off-Loop Theatres. This tour offers an opportunity to learn about Chicago's innovative alternative theatre. Depart from North Western Station at 8:45 A.M. The Tuesday and Wednesday tours will include a sampling of the following: The Organic Theater Company, known for its

powerful and unusual special effects; the Theatre Building, a warehouse converted into three theatres, where we will see the Remains Theatre Group, responsible for the recent successful Moby Dick production; the Steppenwolf Theatre Ensemble, in which members take turns acting and directing; The Body Politic, which focuses on productions of Shakespeare; Gardens, which invites audience participation in its performances. Both tours will visit Second City for a performance and box lunch. Buses will return to the North Western Station by 3:30 P.M.

Tour Three Tuesday, Oct. 11 • Wednesday, Oct. 12 An unusual chance to become acquainted with the enormous scope of the activities conducted by the Catholic Church in the Chicago area, the largest archdiocese in the United States. Depart from North Western Station promptly at 8:45 A.M. for Quigley Prep North, whose chapel is a replica of Sainte Chapelle in Paris. After viewing the famous stained glass windows, we will hear a panel discussion on the special role of Holy Name Cathedral, on the scope of Catholic Charities, and on Catholic Elementary Education. The speakers will be the Very Rev. Timothy J. Lyne, Rev. Roger Coughlan, and Sister Anne Leonard. Next we will go by bus to St. Mary of the Lake Seminary in Mundelein, where Joseph Cardinal Bernardin has graciously opened his residence to our group. Rev. Richard F. Shroeder, Procurator, will be our guide. Lunch will follow at Techny Towers, the Center for Divine Word International. We will conclude the tour with a visit to Misericordia North, to see the remarkable work being done with older handicapped children. We will return to the North Western Station by 3:30 P.M.

Tour Four Tuesday, Oct. 25 • Wednesday, Oct. 26 A unique opportunity to become part of the world of tomorrow by observing methods of applied research being

conducted at the Illinois Institute of Technology in cooperation with business and industry. Depart from the North Western Station at 8:45 A.M. All participants must come on the buses. First we will visit RALES, a simulator used to train railroad engineers by replicating the physical sensations - motion, sights, and sounds experienced on an actual route. Next we will visit a laboratory where we will see wind tunnels being used to determine patterns of wind flow - information vital for designers of buildings and planes. Finally, we will see an industrial laser, and will watch an automated system in operation as a robot carries out a series of complicated tasks. Lunch will be served in the student cafeteria. Return to the North Western Station by 3:30 P.M. Tour Four is limited to 120 participants.

Tuesday, Nov. 8 Wednesday, Nov. 9 Depart from the North Western Station at 8:45 A.M. and from the northeast corner of the Old Orchard parking lot at 9:15 A.M. Travel to Terra Museum of American Art, where Daniel Terra, Ambassador-at-Large for Cultural Affairs in the United States, and Ronald Melvin, Director of Terra Museum, will speak to us before a private viewing of a newly opened exhibit, "The American Superrealism." We will then drive to Noyes Cultural Center, which is run by the Evanston Arts Council and located in a converted school building designed by Burnham. The Center houses some 40 artists and art groups, some of whom we will meet in their studios. Lunch will be provided at the totally reconstructed Orrington Hotel, where we will also have a visual presentation by Mikell Darling, Director of the Evanston Historical Society. A bus tour of the Historic District will be conducted by members of the Evanston Historic Preservation Commission. Provost Raymond W. Mack will speak to us in the Guild Lounge of Northwestern University's Scott Hall, where the afternoon will end with selections from the University's WaaMu show. Buses will return to their points of origin.

Tickets may be ordered singly or in series subscriptions. A series subscription consists of four tours. Preference will be given to series subscriptions, which will be issued in order of their receipt. Single ticket orders will be filled after series ticket orders and will be mailed after August 26, 1983. To order a series subscription, please use coupon A; to order single tickets, use Coupon B. It is important, on either coupon, to indicate whether the alternate day of the week is acceptable if the weekday you prefer is sold out. For series subscriptions, subscribers who list first, second, and third choices will have their orders filled strictly in accordance with their preferences to the extent that tickets remain available. Subscribers who list only one choice will have their orders returned if the series of their choice has been sold out.
