The Downtown Center offers credit and informal classes from morning to night, including some programs for Master's degrees, the Basic Program of Liberal Education for Adults, the Fine Arts Program, the Program in Publishing and Graphic Arts, the Executive Development Program for Federal Personnel, and special Commerce programs. The Home-Study Department offers correspondence courses on the university level. The Union Education Service works with trade-union leaders. The World Politics Program fosters community discussion groups. Community self-help in human relations is encouraged by a special staff. Catalogues and special brochures are available through the Downtown Center, 19 South La Salle Street, DEarborn 2-7245.

THE WOMAN'S COLLEGE BOARD of Chicago, established in 1933, is a non-profit organization serving twenty-nine liberal arts colleges and their local alumnae. It sponsors radio programs by member colleges and is an associate member of the Chicago Educational Television Association. Other services include free college counseling for high-school girls, publication and distribution of a handbook about the member colleges, arranging for admissions conferences with college representatives, promotion of alumnae group study, publication of an alumnae club guide, and placement counseling.
