1973 Program of Field Trips

Only series subscribers to the Speakers Program may purchase tickets for the Field Trips, which are conducted on a Tuesday or a Wednesday schedule the week following each discussion. A tour ticket is valid only on the date for which the ticket is issued, and must be presented for admission. There are no refunds on field trip tickets, and no replacement of lost tickets can be made.

Tour One Tuesday, Sept. 18 • Wednesday, Sept. 19

Depart promptly 8:15 a.m. for Bethlehem Steel's Burns Harbor Plant, the newest and most modern steel mill in the United States. Among other fascinating sights, the plant will include a basic oxygen furnace, 80° hot strip mill, and a slabbing mill. The following plant regulations are mandatory for admission: (1) Clothing suitable for the weather, with slacks recommended and long-sleeved shirts or blouses required; (2) Sturdy, closed-toe walking shoes; (3) Hairdress appropriate for use of hard hats and safety

Tour Two Tuesday, Oct. 2 • Wednesday, Oct. 3

Tour begins 9:00 a.m. at Roosevelt University, 430 South Michigan Avenue: Tuesday, assemble in Ganz Hall; Wednesday, assemble in Patrick O'Malley Theatre.
