1977 Program of Field Trips

Only series subscribers to the Speakers Program may purchase tickets for the Field Trips, which are conducted on a Tuesday or a Wednesday schedule the week following each discussion. A tour ticket is valid only on the date for which the ticket is issued, and must be presented for admission. There are no refunds on field trip tickets, and no replacement of lost tickets can be made. The price of each tour is \$10.00. Luncheon (gratuity included) is provided on all tours. Tours depart from and return to the Clinton Street (west) Entrance to the Chicago & North Western Station except as noted. Tours operate on closely coordinated schedules, and the departure of buses cannot be delayed for late-comers. Comfortable shoes are recommended. Since program arrangements must be made many months in advance, scheduled events may sometimes be subject to change. Please read carefully the instructions on How to Order Tickets.

Tour One Tuesday, Sept. 20 • Wednesday Sept. 21 Buses (each with a Ft. Sheridan escort officer) will depart promptly from Two Locations: North Western Station at 8:30 AM, and Edens Shopping Plaza, Lake Ave. and Skokie Hwy., Wilmette (northeast corner of parking lot) at 8:55 AM. Please indicate on ticket order which bus you will take. Our morning will be spent at Ft. Sheridan, the Army Recruiting Command for the entire country. Here we will tour the base; and following a briefing by the Commander, Maj. Gen.

Eugene Forrester, and the Chief of Staff, we will lunch at the Officers Club. The afternoon will be spent at Great Lakes Naval Training Center-The World's largest—where our tour will include a visit to the Mess Hall, a barracks and an advanced training school such as the Gunnery School. A briefing will be held by Adm. Thomas W. McNamara and other Senior Officers of the Recruit Training and the Service School Com-mands. Return approximately 3:30 PM. Low heels recommended.

Tour Two Tuesday, Oct. 4 . Wednesday, Oct. 5 Chicago bus departs 9:00 AM from North Western Station. Suburban bus departs 9:40 AM from Winnetka Golf Club (Skokie Playfield) parking lot on Oak and Hibbard Rd. for Tempel Farms in Wadsworth, III. We will see the largest group of Lipizzans in the world, whose bloodlines all trace to the original stock from Imperial Austria. They are, today, the North American Continent's greatest representatives of Classical Dressage. We will tour the farms—including the stallion, broodmare, yearling and filly barns; the Haflingers (the Tyrolean mountain horse); and enjoy the area's beautiful lakes, woods and wildlife development plus lush pastures and croplands. We will have a picnic lunch at the lovely estate house, The Retreat. After lunch we will go to the Tempel Performing Arts Center to watch a demonstration of young stallions in training and then a fully uniformed performance of the magnificent Lipizzans. After the show you may tour the main stable. The buses will leave Tempel Farms approximately 2:30 PM, ETA 3:30 PM.

Tour Three Tuesday, Oct. 18 . Wednesday, Oct. 19 Departing promptly at 8:30 AM, this tour will deal, in a light-hearted but enlightening way, with a subject usually avoided but inevitable. First stop will be at the well-maintained Rosehill Cemetery, largest nonsectarian cemetery in the Chicago area. Founded in 1859, the cemetery illustrates much of Chicago history; burial alternatives, including a mausoleum; and the nature and problems of management. The tour will then divide for visits to the studios of Gast Monuments for demonstrations of monument design and building, and to funeral homes to discuss funeral practices and costs, Lunch at Gordana's, a new "Old World" restaurant. In the afternoon the tour will proceed to the Catholic Cemeteries of the Archdiocese of Chicago. Hillside, world's largest cemetery operation, managing some 40 cemeteries and half the area's burials. A brief discussion will highlight ethnic differences, changing social customs, vandalism, etc., also to view modern cemetery equipment, shops, yards and nurseries, and the spectacular Queen of Heaven Mausoleum, accommodating 30,000. Finally a tour of the Brenner Casket Co. to see a full assembly of wood and metal caskets, including upholstery and embroidery. Return to North Western Station approximately 3:45 PM.

Tour Four Tuesday, Nov. 1 • Wednesday, Nov. 2 Depart promptly at 9:00 AM for the University of Chicago where Regenstein Library will open its doors and its Special Collections to us. Experts will display and discuss rare books ranging from 13th century illuminated manuscripts to contemporary working papers of Saul Bellow, as well as rare and special materials from the Far Eastern Collection. Research use and preservation will be demonstrated. Lunch in Hutchinson Commons—a replica of Christ Church Great Hall, Oxford. Bus to Adler Planetarium where the curators have arranged a special display of books with related ancient astronomical instruments. We will be taken behind the scenes to their preparation area. The Field Museum will turn the pages of the Elephant Folio Audubon and, in the President's room, will display such treasures as pirate papers and other collectors' items. Return to North Western Station by 3:30 P.M.

Tour Five Tuesday, Nov. 15 . Wednesday, Nov. 16 Depart promptly at 9:00 AM for the Chicago Historical Society, N. Clark St. and W. North Ave., where we will see and hear a presentation on the history, preservation and acquisition of fashions by Ms. Elizabeth Jachimowicz, Curator of Costumes. Then to the Merchants and Manufacturers Club, Merchandise Mart, for a sneak preview into the men's fashion world. Following this will be a tour of the new and exciting Apparel Center, with lunch and a mini fashion show in The Signature Room. In the afternoon we will visit The School of the Art Institute in its new building. Here, Miss Genevieve Urbain, Vice President, Fashion Director, Marshall Field and Company, will give us an advance insight into the vogue trends with a dynamic visual presentation. Buses will leave for station at 3:00 PM.
