1981 Program of Field Trips

The Field Trips are conducted on a Tuesday or a Wednesday the week following each lecture. The color-coded tour tickets are valid only on the dates for which they are issued and must be presented for admission. There are no refunds on field trip tickets, and no replacement of lost tickets can be made. The price of each tour is \$20.00. Luncheon (gratuity included) is provided on all tours. Tours depart from and return to the Clinton Street (west) Entrance to the Chicago & North Western Station, unless otherwise noted. Tours operate on closely coordinated schedules, and the departure of buses cannot be delayed for late-comers. Comfortable shoes are recommended. Since program arrangements must be made many months in advance, scheduled events may sometimes be subject to change. Please read carefully the instructions on How to Order Tickets. No smoking on buses.

Tour One Tuesday, Sept. 15 • Wednesday, Sept. 16
Depart from North Western Station promptly at
8:45 A.M. for Shedd Aquarium. The morning will
include a lecture by Curator of Education Linda
Wilson on the biological history of the lake, "Man
Acts, Fishes Change," followed by a visit to research
vessel Neptune docked at the Aquarium and
operated by the Hydrographic Survey Company.
During lunch at the Saddle & Cycle Club a program,
"Three Centuries on Lake Michigan," will be
presented by Donn Werling, Director of the Evanston Environmental Associates/Ladd Arboretum. It
includes tales of voyageurs, wrecks, and the singing
of freshwater sea chanties. After lunch Metropolitan Sanitary District engineers will conduct a
tour of the North Side Sewage Treatment Works.
Buses will depart for the North Western Station
at 2:45 P.M.

Tour Two Tuesday, Sept. 29 • Wednesday, Sept. 30 Depart from North Western Station at 9 A.M. for a new facility for the care of the indigent aged at 2325 N. Lakewood, provided and staffed by the Little Sisters of the Poor, a French order in Chicago since 1882. Next we will visit the Sheltered Workshop of the Japanese American Service Committee. which offers work, adult day care, and other social programs. Then we go to the Levy Center for Senior Citizens, one of a network of City of Chicago multipurpose service centers. Lunch will follow at Operation Brotherhood, a cross-cultural, non-profit agency directed by founder Belle Whaley, chiefly to provide food and homemaker services for the elderly. The tour will end with a special demonstration at the Illinois Regional Library for the Blind and Physically Handicapped, one of a series of cultural enrichment programs for Senior Citizens produced by The Chicago Public Library for regular presentation at neighborhood libraries. Depart for North Western Station at 3:15 P.M.

Tour Three Tuesday, Oct. 13 • Wednesday, Oct. 14 Depart from North Western Station at 9:00 A.M. Visit the new Archicenter, where Ruth Moore Garbe and Carolyn Johnson will speak on preservation of Chicago's world famous buildings. Walk along Dearborn viewing old and new landmarks. Tour new atrium office of the architectural firm of Skidmore, Owings and Merrill and see the firm's computer, which can produce drawings electronically. Lunch at the Como Inn. In the afternoon we will visit the Illinois Institute of Technology and observe students at work in Crown Hall, designed by Mies van der Rohe, and hear Dean Gerald McSheffrey speak on the education of architects. The tour will end at the University of Illinois Circle Campus, where Dean Richard Whitaker will guide us through studios where future architects are being trained. Return to North Western Station by 3:30 P.M.

Tour Four Tuesday, Oct. 27 • Wednesday, Oct. 28 Meet at 9:15 A.M. at the Continental Bank, 231 S. La Salle, Floor 21, Shareholders Room. Edward S. Bottum, Executive Vice-President of the Trust Dept., will discuss the future of banking; Systems Division staff will show the latest technology being used; a tour will take us to the Bond Dept. for a look at the security system, the money machine, and a demonstration of how modern banking methods have affected bank architecture. We will lunch at The Parthenon Restaurant at Halsted and Van Buren in Greek Town. The afternoon will be spent at IBM at One IBM Plaza. There a nontechnical presentation on the evolution of the computer will be followed by discussion of current business - especially banking - uses of computers and a demonstration of present generation machines. Return to the North Western Station at 3:15 P.M.

Tour Five Tuesday, Nov. 10 . Wednesday, Nov. 11 Depart from the North Western Station at 8:45 A.M. for Motorola, Inc. We will be shown how the process which began when a radio was placed in a car has developed to the point where voices can be sent from the moon to earth, and now to the point where we can have a cordless telephone. This demonstration of how space age techniques have been applied to the development and production of sophisticated everyday communication tools will be followed by lunch at the Motorola Corporate headquarters. The afternoon will be spent at WTTW, where William W. McCarter, President and General Manager, WTTW, will introduce us to cables, discs, and satellites. Following this, Field Electronic Publishing, Inc. will demonstrate Keyfax, an electronic newspaper, the first commercial Teletext equipment in the U.S. Return to North Western Station by 3:30 P.M.
