Each field trip will be offered twice, once on a Tuesday and again on Wednesday. The price of each tour is \$20.00. Lunch (gratuity included) is provided on all tours. All tours depart from and return to North Western Railroad Station. Tours operate on closely coordinated schedules, and the departure of buses cannot be delayed for latecomers. Since program arrangements must be made many months in advance, scheduled events may sometimes be subject to change. Comfortable shoes are recommended for all tours. Smoking is not permitted on the buses. Please read carefully the instructions on how to order tickets.

Tour One Tuesday, September 18 ● Wednesday, September 19

State and Local Politics in Action

Depart from North Western Station at 8:45 A.M. We will go first to City Hall to visit the Board of Elections. Here we will study the complex process that insures the rights of citizens to elect their officials. We will then proceed to two wards, one on the North Side and the other on the South Side, both with racially and socio-economically diverse populations. The first is the 48th Ward, where we will visit Senn Academy (formerly Senn High School) before touring the ward by bus with guides from Ald. Marion Volini's office. We will then travel to the 4th Ward, where we will have lunch at Provident Hospital. Members of Ald. Tim Evans's staff will serve as guides for our bus tour of this ward. Our guides will explain the functioning of the

political process in their wards. We will return to North Western Station by 3:30 P.M.

Tour Two Tuesday, October 2 ● Wednesday, October 3

City in Transition: North of the River Becomes River North

Depart from North Western Station at 8:45 A.M. This tour will explore the revitalization of a manufacturing and warehouse area into Chicago's newest cultural district, accommodating practitioners of the arts and professions as well as providing retail spaces, restaurants, and alternative urban housing. The tour will visit The Chicago Conservation Center, a consortium of specialists in painting, textiles and paper conservation; two apartment interiors in an 1888 loft that retains the architectural character of its industrial past; Leslie Hindman, the Midwest's largest auction house; local art galleries, including Zolla/Lieberman, the first to relocate to this area; Sue Lindstrom's Paper Source, center of hand-crafted paper and art framing; and Gruen Iron Works, a gallery/studio where we will see a demonstration by the owner, Erwin C. Gruen. Marjorie Craig Benton, co-founder of the Peace Museum, and Mark Rogovin, the museum's executive director, will speak to us during lunch at Lino's. We will return to North Western Station by 3:30 P.M. Note: This tour includes a great deal of walking, stair climbing, and standing.

Tour Three Tuesday, October 16 . Wednesday, October 17

Shall We Dance?

Depart from North Western Station at 8:45 A.M. Our first stop will be at On Stage Chicago—School for Per-forming Artists, where we will watch a rehearsal in an environment of interrelated performing arts. Next we will visit the Ruth Page Foundation School of Dance, where Miss Page will speak to us and show us films of some of her famous ballets. We will then go to the Chicago City Ballet, where Maria Tallchief Paschen and choreographer Paul Mejia will be our hosts at rehearsal. After lunch at Sogni Dorati Restaurant, we will head south to Kennedy-King College, where Joseph Holmes will introduce his dance troupe in a dress rehearsal for its tenth anniversary tour. We will finish the tour at the Academy of Art, Music, Dance and Theater, a new private high school where artistically gifted teenagers are being encouraged to develop their talents. We will return to North Western Station by 3:30 P.M.

Tour Four Tuesday, October 30 . Wednesday, October 31

Only in Chicago: Three Trading Floors Depart from North Western Station at 8:15 A.M. Our itinerary will include three of the world's principal trading floors: the Chicago Mercantile Exchange, the Chicago Board of Trade, and the Chicago Board of Options Exchange. We will focus on two aspects of these exchangestheir operations and their architectural settings. We will see the trading floors come alive with the opening bell and will have the trading process explained to us. The Mercantile Exchange claims the largest clear-span trading facility in the world; the Board of Trade is housed in a landmark Art Deco building; and the Chicago Board of Options Exchange has moved into a new building with some of the most advanced communications equipment available. We will have the privilege of going down on the CBOE's trading floor. Lunch will be served at the Board of Trade on Tuesday and at the Chicago Board of Options Exchange on Wednesday. We will return to North Western Station by 3:00 P.M.

Tour Five Tuesday, November 13 . Wednesday, November 14

Sweet Business of Chicago

Depart from North Western Station at 8:30 A.M. We travel first to the Kitchens of Sara Lee, a division of Consolidated Foods. There we will tour the production lines of some of the division's most popular frozen baked goods. The talents of Lutz Olkiewicz, product manager of research and development at Sara Lee, and of Elaine Sherman, owner of Madame Chocolate, will be demonstrated as they prepare a Chocolate Fantasy. This superb dessert will be served as the finale of our lunch at Sara Lee. The afternoon will be spent at E. J. Brach & Sons, a division of American Home Products. Beginning in Chicago eighty years ago as Brach's Palace of Sweets, this company has grown into one of America's leading candy manufac-turers. As we tour the facilities, we will follow the process through which the cocoa bean is transformed into candy ready for packaging.
